- We have provided several tasks that will support your child's learning during the current school closure.
- Many of the tasks are based on what the children would have been studying in class.
- Work can be recorded in your child's Home Learning book where appropriate.
- As teachers will not be able to oversee or feedback on this work, any support you can provide will be helpful.

Curriculum area	Tasks			
Reading	 Teach your adult how to read the speed sound chart in the front of your RWI book. Spend time reading your Story Book. Think about whether you enjoyed the story or not. What did you like? What didn't you like? Would you recommend it to a friend? Do you know any similar stories? How many different graphemes can you spot in your Story Book? e.g. can you find the grapheme 'ee'? Have a go at the Phonics Activity (see below). Choose one Comprehension Activity (see below). 			
Writing	 Look out for signs of Spring and keep a list of them. Keep a diary during the time our school is closed. Write in it as often as you can. What are you doing to keep busy? Have you found a new interest or hobby? Remember, a diary is like a friend so you can use it to share your thoughts and feelings as well as to record what you have done during the day. Write a letter to a friend or someone in your family. Ask your grown-up if they can post it next time they go to the shops. Choose one Writing Activity (see below). 			
Maths	 Practise your 2, 5 and 10 times-tables. Practise telling the time using 'o'clock' and 'half past'. Think of an even number and find half of it. Think of an even number and double it. Use objects to help you. Make a number line. Practice adding and subtracting numbers using your number line. Play a pictogram game. Draw a shape and describe it to your grown-up (you will need to count the sides and the edges). See if they can guess the shape. Make a picture using your shapes. Estimate the length of an object in centimetres (cm). Use a ruler to measure it accurately. Was your estimate a sensible one? Ask an adult to help you find a recipe for a cake or some biscuits. Can you measure the ingredients accurately?

Phonics Activity

Comprehension Activity

Recipe for a Marmalade Sandwich

Ingredients

- two slices of bread
- butter or margarine
- marmalade



Instructions

- 1. Spread some butter or margarine onto both slices of bread
- 2. Spread some marmalade (or jam if you prefer) onto the slices of bread
- 3. Put one slice of bread on top of the other
- **4.** Gently press down
- **5.** Enjoy your sandwich!

Questions

- 1. What are these instructions for?
- 2. How many slices of bread do you need to make the sandwich?
- 3. If you don't like marmalade, what could you use instead?

Maybe you can make the sandwich and share it with your grown-up!

Comprehension Activity

(AND AUNT LUCY'S) MARMALADE

Tip: Please be aware that this recipe has been handed down to Paddington from his Aunt Lucy. Quantities and techniques may vary from the jungles of Peru so please adapt to your taste and own kitchen utensils.



INGREDIENTS:

- 1. 12 ripe from the tree Seville oranges (Mrs Bird says this is normally about 1 kilogram)
- 2. Preserving sugar (Mrs. Bird says this is better than jam sugar for marmalade and should be twice the weight of the oranges. Mrs Bird and I balance the scales and then do it again to get the right weight.)
- 3. I lemon per 12 (1 kg) oranges
- 4. One large bucket of water (approx. 2.5 litres)

Questions

- 1. Who gave this recipe to Paddington Bear?
- 2. How many oranges do you need to make the marmalade?
- 3. How much sugar do you need?
- 4. Why may you need to adapt the recipe?

Don't forget to use your phonic knowledge for spelling. Use capital letters, finger spaces and full stops. Try to use exclamation marks for the exciting parts of the adventure!






