Reading	•	Keep practising your speed sounds (in your booklet which is part of your Reading Pack and at the front of your RWI books).			
	•	Ask your adult to help you find a book you haven't read before. Before you read it, make some predictions about the story. Remember to use the cover and the title to help you. Share the book with your adult. Discuss whether any of your predictions were correct.

	•	Ask someone in your family to write a letter to you. Read it out loud to your adult.			
	Try the Phonics Activity (Page 9).				
	•	Choose <u>one</u> Comprehension Activity (Page 10 or 11).			
Writing	•	Use your list of the signs of Spring (from your previous Home Learning Pack). Can you write a poem using some of these words? A poem doesn't have to rhyme but they are fun when they do!			
	•	Remember to keep writing in your diary. Write in it as often as you can even if it is only one or two sentences. What are you doing to keep busy? Have you found a new interest or hobby? Remember, a diary is like a friend so you can use it to share your thoughts and feelings as well as to record what you have done during the day.			
	•	Write a list of jobs which you can do to help your adult around the house.			
	Complete <u>both</u> Writing Activities (see below).				
		If you feel like you have lots of brain power for reading and writing this week, you might decide to accept the Challenges!

	•	Keep practising your 2, 5 and 10 times-tables.			
	•	Order the members of your family according to their height.			
	•	Which person is the tallest/shortest?			
	•	Find different items around your house and have a go at measuring them. Use straws/pencils/your hands to measure them.

- Which item was the longest and which was the shortest? How do you know? Why is it important to measure in a straight line?
- If you have a ruler or a tape measure, now have a go at measuring them accurately. Perhaps you could estimate the length or height of the objects first.
- If you have a computer you could play this measurement game.

Transport

How has public transport in London changed over time?

We will look at the different types of public transport in London and explore how it has changed over time.

Here are some questions and ideas. Use them over the following weeks to help you investigate our new topic. Research and discuss them with a grown up.

- Look at photos from the past to explore how public transport in London was different when your grandparents and great-grandparents were little?
- How have trains, buses and taxis in London changed over time?
- What impact has this had on people's lives?
- When were buses first used in London? Compare an old and new bus.
- When was the first underground train used? How have they changed?
- Can you find out about the history of Bounds Green station?

You do not need to do all of this in one week!

Each week we shall be exploring a different enquiry question. This week's enquiry question is....

Week 1 - Enquiry Question

What different types of public transport are there in London today?

- What is public transport?
- Look at different photos of vehicles.
- Name and describe the different types of transport.
- What are they called?
- Who uses them?
- How they are powered?

Do they all need a road?




Awe and Wonder Science Activity

Plastic Bag Parachutes

Make sure you have a grownup to help you with this activity, especially when finding somewhere to drop the parachute from.

You might also need some grownup help with making the holes in your parachute. Have fun!













- 1. Cut off across the corners of the square, creating an octagon shape.
- 2. Hole punch in the middle of each side.
- 3. Put a piece of string through each of the 8 holes and tie.
- 4. Gather the 8 pieces of string together and tie to your plastic person.
- 5. Cut out a small circle from the centre of your parachute to let air pass through gently.
- 6. Get up somewhere high, on top of a climbing frame or up some stairs.
- 7. Hold the centre of your parachute, with the person underneath. Let go and watch how they travel to the ground.
- 8. Does the parachute open? Does the person travel fast or slow? Does the person go straight down or to one side? Does it spin? What could you do differently?

The Science Bit

When you release the parachute the weight pulls down on the strings and opens up a large surface area of material that slows down the person. The larger the surface area the more air resistance and the slower the parachute will drop.

PE Activity

- Our topic is Travel. Can you think of different ways you can travel around your home? Can you hop from the kitchen to the sitting room? Can you crawl from your bedroom to the bathroom?
- Ask your adult if you can do PE with Joe at 9am (a 30 minute workout).
